(this statement was given to worship participants on Nov. 28th, Sunday)

On November 24, during evening Choir practice, a sound was heard outside by the garden courtyard. On checking, a stranger was present asking for money for bus fare. With a charitable heart, the stranger was admitted and choir members gathered some bus money together. Then, the stranger drew out a hand gun and proceeded to rob everyone present. The gunman demanded car keys from Eileen Boyd, the music director and left in a threatening manner, stealing her car. Shaken by the experience, the police were called in to investigate and get a description of the robber. Soon after, Rev. Motoe arrived, prayed with the choir and began coordination with church leaders. In addition, Russ Fong, the SJUMC Basketball Board President, was informed so the various team leaders that practice at SJUMC could be extra careful when at the church.

As a result of the shocking robbery, the security monitoring company has been notified to immediately contact the police in the event of any alarm upon our request, and the Trustee Facility Sub-Committee will be meeting with suggestions from law enforcement shortly on December 6, 2010

While as a church body, we are called to help others, caution must apply when we see strangers on our property, even when they claim to be lost, or needing some type of help. While church security and ideas for improvement are explored, we are reminded to be aware of our surrounding situation and to exercise caution. Whether we are at church or a shopping mall, many of the same cautions apply. For people asking for some type of help of money, food or a ride, we strongly discourage any direct offer of assistance.

In the past, we felt that there may not be any direct threat, especially if we are not alone at the church. While this robbery doesn't make our church UNSAFE, it does indicate prudent caution is always appropriate in today's society. Please keep valuables in cars hidden out-of-sight. Don't be embarrassed to ask for an escort to your car.

Our choir, pianist and music director have been through a dreadful experience and your support for them is appreciated. We especially appreciate Eileen's leadership during this event. We thank God that none of our choir was hurt and we also pray for the man who robbed us. As a church, We will do our best to keep our campus safe. May God bless you

Church Security—The Board of Trustees discussed the security at the Church and is making a few changes. On Wednesday, Dec, 15th Bode & Bode Locksmiths changed 26 lock cylinders and made new keys to go with them. The rekeyed locks were # 10 for the gate padlocks, #9 for the Business office and #14 for the Choir Door. The choir door will now be the same as #4 that opens the Fellowship Hall and the Sanctuary. People with those keys only will need to get replacement keys from Art Imagine. For meetings at night the north gate will be the only one open from now on so you can park in the back. Please leave nothing visible in your car at any time to prevent burglaries. Additional lighting for around the Church and courtyard are budgeted for next year. We will keep you posted. Thank you.

SSIP Food Closet update

Our congregation is a part of the South Sacramento Interfaith partnership (SSIP) which ministers to people in our area through the Food Closet which is housed at the Bethany Presbyterian Church at Fruitridge and 24th Street. Our congregation supports the Food Closet and SSIP through monetary donations, food donations, as well as volunteer giving through service in the Food Closet and on the SSIP Board of Directors and supporting committees.

As the new facility for the Food Closet is nearly complete, we would like to invite all of you to come by and check it out.

In our church narthex (foyer) is a large plastic container to receive your gifts of non-perishable food stuffs for the Food Closet. Each Sunday check the "SSIP bag" in the worship folder to learn what food items is currently needed at the Food Closet. There is always a need for general and miscellaneous non-perishable food items, but the items in the bag each week are the current needs. The Food Closet also accepts brown grocery bags. SSIP is currently not collecting egg cartons at this time.

During the month of November, 2010—the SSIP Food Closet served a total of 7,294 persons which included adults, seniors, children and infants. This represents 1,808 unduplicated households. The number of person served and the food delivered express the

importance of this ministry.

We are still in need of volunteers to work inside the Food Closet on Mondays or to work in the metal shed storage locker bagging USDA commodities. Worker inside the Food Closet do a specific task; worker #1 prepares Bag#1 and worker #2 prepares Bag #2, worker #3 adds fresh produce and gets the number of USDA bags needed from a bin and worker # 4 adds rice, additional breads and pastries to the bags and call the client to the window. Workers who bag USDA commodities place 7-8 items in a doubled plastic bag and the tie the bag closed. The items vary each month depending on what is received from Food link and may include: a can of beans, fruits, vegetables, spaghetti sauce, tomato sauce, a bag of pasta, powder milk, etc. If you would like to volunteer on a regular basis or as a substitute, please call Francis Lee 427-7983, Jane Combs 443-2839 or June Tanihana 395-1355.

Ethnic Young Adult Summer Internships Applications due Jan. 10

Get started now to meet the deadline to apply for a 2011 Ethnic Young Adult (EYA) Summer Internship in Washington, D.C. The EYA program is for 18 to 22-year olds with an interest in exploring issues of public policy, social justice advocacy and social change.

Interns will work in social justice placements in Washington D.C. from May 28 to July 31. GBCS will provide round-trip transportation to and from Washington, D.C.; housing for the eight-week EYA Internship; commuter stipend for travel to intern work sites; and \$1,500 for each intern for the eight-week period.

Interns will live in a Christian community. Work placements will be supplemented by evening intern-led devotions, Friday seminars on topics of social justice concern, area field trips, and Sunday worship in area United Methodist churches. Participants must commit to being present at these activities. Application and recommendation forms may be obtained from the GBCS Web site: www.umc-gbcs.org.

Young Adults Do Mission Through Justice

Who is eligible? If you are between the ages of 20 to 30 and are committed to addressing the root causes of injustice so that the gospel is lived out alongside communities and organizations seeking peace and systemic transformation, consider applying to become a United Methodist US-2 or Mission Intern. US-2s serve in the United States for two years. Mission Interns serve for 16 months in an international setting, then 16 months in the US. Both US-2s and Mission Interns commit to linking their faith to justice. **How do young adults apply?** Applications are due February 15, 2011.
