Recently I was asked what the liturgical dance during the Christmas Eve Service was about. No one said anything about the dance! I was told that we could expect average of 25 people for the Christmas eve, and we had 180 people (Praise God!). I was thankful to have the opportunity to work with Courtney Goto. The reason I did not explain about the dance other than reading the John's passage (see above) was that interptation may be varies according to each person. SSIP FOOD CLOSET UPDATE

Our congregation is a part of the South Sacramento Interfaith partnership (SSIP) which ministers to people in our area through the Food Closet which is housed at the Bethany Presbyterian Church at Fruitridge and 24th Street. Our congregation supports the Food Closet and SSIP through monetary donations, food donations, as well as volunteer giving through service in the Food Closet and on the SSIP Board of Directors and supporting committees.

In our church narthex (foyer) is a large plastic container to receive your gifts of non-perishable food stuffs for the Food Closet. Each Sunday check the "SSIP bag" in the worship folder to learn what food items is currently needed at the Food Closet. There is always a need for general and miscellaneous non-perishable food items, but the items in the bag each week are the current needs. The Food Closet also accepts brown grocery bags. SSIP is not currently egg cartons at this time.

During the month of December 2009----the SSIP Food Closet served a total of 5092 persons which included adults, seniors, children and infants. This represents 1,309 unduplicated households. The number of person served and the food delivered express the

importance of this ministry.

In December, the volunteer who credited their hours to SJUMC were: Jane Combs, Richard Yokoi, Audrey Yokoi, June Tanihana, Sue Kashiwagi, Frances Lee, Francis Asahara, Lisa Tanaka, Lester Wataji, Jan Muraki, Cecil Combs, Meg Tanaka, Yoshi Nishihawa, and Katie Marshall and an anonymous someone. We are still in need of volunteers to work inside the Food Closet on Mondays or to work in the metal shed storage locker bagging USDA commodities. Worker inside the Food Closet do a specific task; worker #1 prepares Bag#1 and worker #2 prepares Bag #2, worker #3 adds fresh produce and gets the number of USDA bags needed from a bin and worker # 4 adds rice, additional breads and pastries to the bags and call the client to the window. Workers who bag USDA commodities place 7-8 items in a doubled plastic bag and the tie the bag closed. The items vary each month depending on what is received from Food link and may include: a can of beans, fruits, vegetables, spaghetti sauce, tomato sauce, a bag of pasta, powder milk, etc. If you would like to volunteer on a regular basis or as a substitute, please call Francis Lee 427-7983, Jane Combs 443-2839 or June Tanihana 395-1355.

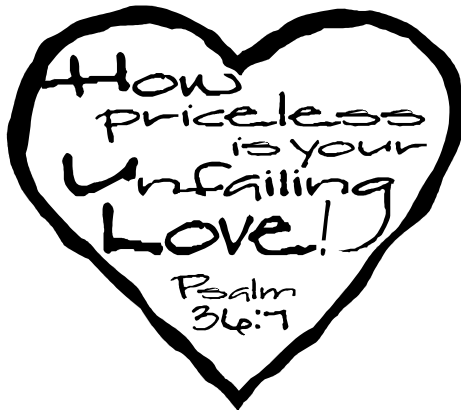

One would think that after 40 years of coaching and at 72 years old, one would want to kick back and relax. This is true for most of people his age, but not for Chuck Alicaya, also known as the "oldest coach in the league." Being proud of this title, Chuck is coaching the C-2 girls, a team of rambunctious 7th graders. What would motivate someone to want to coach a bunch of pre-teen girls? According to Chuck, "I love watching kids develop, learn, having fun, and showing good sportsmanship." His philosophy is teaching players that it's not all about winning, but about improving their basketball skills, working as a team, and playing to have fun. When asked what advice he would give a new coach, Chuck replied, "See that kids have fun and learn. Do not stress winning!"

Along with coaching the C-2 girl's team, you can find Chuck on Friday nights at the Sacramento Asian Sports Foundation coaching five, six, and seven year-olds in the Instructional League.


Chuck has coached players of all different ages and levels, from the little tykes in the church instructional league to high school-aged competition players in the Sacramento Rebels and Barons Clubs, and players beyond high school in the Sacramento Counts and Saints Clubs.

Chuck is quite an athlete himself. Growing up, he played football, basketball, tennis, softball, boxing, ping-pong, volleyball and bowling. He

continues to play tennis and is a member of the Southgate Racquet Club, Regular 50+ Tennis League and Over 60's Summer Tennis League. He not only plays tennis, but is also a tennis instructor. He provides private lessons to players of all ages. One of his students is Lori Lee-Lewis. She has high regards for his teaching abilities and for his great patience. "Chuck is an awesome tennis instructor! He always gives support and is patient even if I don't do exactly what I'm supposed to. Chuck has taken my game to a new level!" Lori said.

Chuck and his wife, Emi, have been attending SJUMC for the past 41 years. They started attending when their son, Lance was two years old. Now Lance, along with his wife, Teri and their three children Katie (14), Tara (11), and Timmy (9) attend SJUMC as well. Their younger son, Mark and his wife Tracy and their two children Connor (6) and Kendall (4) live in Sunnyvale. Both Chuck's sons have followed in Dad's footsteps in coaching. Lance is currently the assistant coach of the SJUMC Girls D-1 team and Mark is coaching a youth team in San Jose.

Chuck is active member of the Garden Angels. Along with sports, gardening is one of his favorite hobbies. So what else does Chuck like to do when he's not busy coaching basketball, teaching tennis, or working in the church gardens? He will try to kick back and relax by playing computer games, reading and watching TV... but, of course, this is only in the off-season!

Haiti: Expanded Programs Deliver Hope

In Haiti, the church is delivering hope in the midst of poverty and civil crisis through three expanded initiatives:

School Fees. The Methodist Church of Haiti has long provided education for children in cities and remote rural areas. During the current civil crisis, because parents cannot pay school fees (about \$250 per child per year), the church has been unable to pay teachers. Assistance with fees would guarantee that the church's educational program will continue through this difficult time.

Health Care. The church provides health care through seven district health sites. The church has put out an "SOS call for solidarity" to help enable them to pursue desperately needed improvements in health. There is a 50% morbidity rate for children between the ages of 0 and 5. Community-based primary health care includes hygiene education, medicine, and nutritional support.

Spiritual Care. Recognizing the importance of spiritual care in times of national emergency, the church is organizing an event to train its leaders to recognize and care for the long-term effects of trauma. The church is in a unique position to bring healing.

Hunger is a much too familiar phenomenon in Haiti. For a number of years, the lunch program has provided daily meals in 93 schools. It reaches 16,877 youngsters.

For many, this is the only meal they will receive. A

meal of beans and rice can be prepared for about 20 cents per student. As the project has grown, so has the need for contributions. The Haiti Task Force of Michigan, in collaboration with the Methodist Church of Haiti, began this project in order to improve student health and educational performance.
